
Connect and Engage



Increasing engagement, access and participation in the cultural life of the Pikes Peak region is a central goal of COPPeR -- because we know arts and culture makes our region an exciting place to live and visit.

2012 was a very successful year for COPPeR's online arts and culture events calendar, with site metric statistics continually on the rise. Unique visitors increased 5% and total visitors increased 14.5% for the year, while page views increased more than 7% since 2011. The year saw facelift enhancements with the help of Artsopolis. Site enhancements include increased search functionality, simplified category titles, Top Ten events and other weekly features on the home page, and Facebook integration to allow users to share, "Like," and review events. With these enhancements, it's easier than ever for users to spread the word and enjoy arts, culture, and fun around the area.

Public Art Directory

In June, COPPeR launched the region's first Public Art Directory on PeakRadar.com, including descriptions and images from public art pieces in the City of Colorado Springs and Art on the Streets collections. To celebrate the launch, Public Art & the Art of Placemaking: Reception and Panel Discussion was hosted on June 5th with the help of the Public Art Commission. Featured panelists included Matt Chasansky, Percent for Art Public Art Program Manager for Denver International Airport; Chris Weed, Sculptor and Public Artist in Colorado Springs; and Matt Mayberry, Executive Director of the Colorado Springs Pioneers Museum.

COMING IN 2013: Through partnerships with regional community leaders, COPPeR will add public art collections in Manitou Springs and the Tri-Lakes area to the Public Art Directory.

PeakRadar Pages

To prepare for the newest edition of the Peak Radar Pages (to be released in the first quarter of 2013), COPPeR welcomed UCCS intern Jessi Manthei to begin collecting and editing information about each arts and cultural organization in the Pikes Peak region. This 2013 publication has 35 new organization listings and includes a section dedicated to Peak Arts Fund.

Summer Concert Guide

Our community loves music! And you clearly love our Free Outdoor Summer Concert Guide, which featured 15 separate concert series, including three series that were new in 2012, compiled into one handy tool. The guide connected happening from Woodland Park to Manitou Springs, and downtown Colorado Springs up to First and Main Town Center and more. A record-breaking 46,000 copies of the guide were downloaded from COPPeR's website, as well as printed copies distributed at festivals and events throughout the summer. The 2012 Free Outdoor Summer Concert Guide proved once again that there's fun to be had any day of the week, for even the smallest budget.

City Administration Building Art Exhibitions

In partnership with the Office of Sustainability and Innovation, COPPeR assists the City of Colorado Springs in hosting and choosing local artists to display work in the lobby of the City Administration Building each quarter. The first artist, photographer Ricardo Villa exhibited in the space in the fourth quarter.

Coffee with COPPeR

This year we continued our "Coffee with COPPeR" series. Individuals and organizations made presentations on current creative initiatives to include the Colorado Springs Fire Festival, Pikes Peak Sings, and the Branding Initiative. We also used this series to release our recent Arts and Economic Prosperity Data (see page 8). Future Coffee with COPPeR convenings will be used as an opportunity to share updates on the region's Cultural Plan, a 10-year strategic plan that aims to develop, enliven, enhance and promote arts, culture and creative industries in the Pikes Peak region.

Business and Arts Lunch

COPPeR partnered with the Regional Business Alliance (formally the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce) on the fifth annual fall luncheon celebrating and recognizing businesses and individuals that support and promote arts and creativity. The luncheon featured performances by local arts groups on four stages and awards were presented to Epicentral Coworking, US Bank, and Christian Keesee of Kirkpatrick Bank. In 2012 we also introduced a new award that recognizes businesses that use art to tackle community challenges: The Creative Initiative Award. Our 2012 winner, Wild Fire Tees, was formed in the hours after the Waldo Canyon Fire devastated the Mountain Shadows neighborhood, this organization merged the art of high-quality design with social media skills to produce and sell T-shirts, with 100 percent of the proceeds benefitting wildfire relief nonprofits.

After our 2012 Business and Arts Lunch we surveyed attendees and 74% of respondents gave the lunch a five star rating, commenting that "this was the BEST event of this type that I have ever attended," "wonderful energy," "I learned so much about our arts and cultural community – I had no idea."

Building Community



We build our community through the stewardship of our Cultural Plan, leadership on community boards and committees, and connecting our region with national arts and culture best practices, because we know creativity is a catalyst for innovation, growth, prosperity, and vitality.

Peak Arts Fund



In the Spring we launched Peak Arts Fund, an united campaign that raised funds for 15 nonprofit arts organizations in the Pikes Peak region. The fund encourages a broader segment of our community to enjoy and support the arts by specifically reaching out to the business community through workplace giving, in-kind donations to the Peak Arts Card or other employee-engagement activities. In 2012 we partnered with 18 businesses, facilitated 9 workplace giving campaigns and received contributions from 108 individuals, totaling \$36,955. The fund's administrative costs are underwritten by its Founders Circle: Pikes Peak Community Foundation, Bee Vradenburg Foundation, Inasmuch Foundation and Kirkpatrick Family Fund, allowing each gift to make the maximum impact.

Art in Storefronts

COPPeR often has a seat at the table when it comes to working toward making our community more livable. After a suggestion from an Urban Land Institute panel that visited last summer, COPPeR developed a solution for the downtown area to fill vacant store windows with artwork. Art in Storefronts is designed to work with business and property owners to reactivate vacant store windows by filling them with non-commercial art installations, artwork, creative businesses or pop-up shops in order to brighten the downtown area, increase foot traffic, and showcase local artists.

COPPeR Downtown Office and Art Space

COPPeR serves walk-in visitors every day, directing them to area attractions and arts opportunities. We host rotating art displays on our walls, and welcome collaborations with area nonprofits. Our proximity to the University of Colorado Springs GOCA 121 gallery space allows us to participate in First Friday art openings, adding greater visibility to our office and programs. In 2012, COPPeR exhibited works by painters Liese Chavez, George Sanchez, and Lance Green, and photorgraphers Bryan Oller and Nichole Montanez of Studio80six in our downtown office space. Special thanks goes to Nor'wood for allowing us to continue this part of our outreach.

Arts Bootcamps

COPPeR staff and board worked to present workshops to arts organizations and artists in meaningful topic areas such as marketing, intellectual property law, audience development, governance and other best practices. As part of COPPeR's commitment to strengthening our arts community, we will continue to offer a series of "boot camps" in 2013, all of which are designed to help artists and arts organizations become more sustainable and successful.

Advocacy

The ongoing, essential work COPPeR does every day includes creating toolkits so volunteers and community members can speak out about the importance of arts and culture; continued policy study at the state and national level; and training volunteers in how to tell our story and the story of the arts. COPPeR disseminates e-newsletters about arts and culture policy at the state, national, and local level, speaks to community organizations in business, education, and civic life.



Research

COPPeR released the Arts & Economic Prosperity Study in June, which measures the economic impact of nonprofit arts and cultural organizations and their audiences in the region. The study was conducted by Americans for the Arts, a national nonprofit arts advocacy group, in tandem with 182 other regions across the United States.

Right now, cities around the world are competing to attract new businesses as well as our brightest young professionals. International studies show that the winners will be communities that offer an abundance of arts and cultural opportunities. As the arts flourish, so will creativity and innovation – the fuel that drives our global economy. The key lesson from Arts & Economic Prosperity is that the arts industry is not only resilient in times of economic uncertainty, but is also a key driver to our economic recovery and prosperity. By investing in the arts, the Pikes Peak Region will reap the additional benefit of jobs, economic growth and a quality of life that positions our community to compete in a 21st century creative economy.

The nonprofit arts industry in the Pikes Peak region generates

2 Million in Annual Economic Impact

\$37.4 million in spending by nonprofit arts groups \$34.5 million in spending by their audiences.



These results send a strong signal that when we invest in the arts, we not only enhance our quality of life, we also invest in our region's economic well-being. And the arts are strong in our community – with an economic impact significantly above the national median.

5,291 volunteers with an estimated value of donated 106,592 hours \$2.3 million

This tremendous contribution is not measured in the overall economic impact figure, but is significant nonetheless.




Three-quarters of surveyed organizations provide special programming to children and youth, both in the school system and after school.
